- Priority 1: Takeaways from NACCHO Annual
  - It was helpful to hear about different projects at local health departments around the country.
  - One project that stood out was Garrett County and their Open Source tool.
    - Angie will reach out to see if they can demonstrate their project to the group. She'll also share their resources with the group
  - We have a lot more that connects us than what differentiates us.
  - As we look forward to NACCHO Annual 2020, we can start to ask ourselves "Where health data ends and IT begins."
    - This could be a possible roundtable or townhall and discussion.
      - Within our CoP, we have a couple of different ways that IT departments and Informatics departments work together.
        - Tracey works in an IT department but has nothing for Informatics, there's a separate team
        - Cassondra has a similar set up with a technician and a separate Informatics; they work closely together
        - Rochelle from Dakota is like Olmsted County and this works well

- Mike Ones works to bridge IT with informatics in his role as a business analyst. He will be able to share his expertise with the group at a future meeting.
- NACCHO Annual 2020 will take place in Denver and have a track for IT and another for Informatics. We can brainstorm potential ways to support this community, in person and digitally, at the conference.
- <u>Priority 2:</u> Website Accessibility
